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Women Empowerment is South Asia through Ecotourism

Inception Workshop for the Rural and Ecotourism based Social Enterprise Project for Sustainable Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia was held in New Delhi and Dehradun, November 25-28 2019

Sri Lanka Ecotourism Foundation (SLEF) represented SWAN Sri Lanka Chapter in the above Workshop and Field Visits

Among the flagship projects of the South Asia Women's Network (SWAN) is the Rural and Ecotourism based Social Enterprise Project for Sustainable Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia.

In the opening welcome remarks at the Workshop, Professor & Ambassador, Veena Sikri, Convener, South Asia Women's Network (SWAN) & Vice Chairperson of South Asia Foundation (SAF-India) said "Tourism is one of the natural avenues for income generation across South Asia. It is also the most instinctive and successful way to bring the peoples of South Asia closer to each other. Ecotourism is environmentally responsible tourism. It inculcates respect for different cultures and sub-cultures, and is essential for sustainable development of regions and people. SWAN emphasizes the vital role of ecotourism for integrating women into the process of sustainable development. Women play a central role in rural communities in executing agricultural processes (from sowing to harvesting), in manufacturing of handicrafts and textiles, arts and music, cuisine and hospitality, preservation of the environment and solid waste management, cultural and heritage preservation and inculcating traditional values for the next generation. All these are core values for the development of ecotourism. By making local communities the principal beneficiaries in ecotourism projects, the aspect of gender empowerment for the women in these communities receives the highest priority. Ecotourism becomes the vehicle for skills, livelihood and sustainable development for the women of South Asia. Through this workshop, SWAN is planning to create an e-portal to develop rural and Ecotourism which will enhance knowledge and bring the women of South Asia closer to each other".

The South Asia Women's Network (SWAN) started work on the above project in 2014, on the eve of SWAN's Sixth Annual General Conference, held in Thimphu, Bhutan, in August/September 2014. The Tourism Council of Bhutan and SWAN co-organized the Special Workshop on "Ecotourism for Sustainable Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia".

The Ecotourism Society of India was the facilitator for the Workshop. This Workshop deliberated extensively on the enormous power and potential of rural tourism and ecotourism as facilitators for gender empowerment through socio-economic development focused on poverty alleviation, protection of the biodiversity, environment, institutional and human resource development, and promotion of the infrastructure of connectivity, including friendship through people-to-people connectivity across South Asia.

Palitha Gurusinghe, President, Sri Lanka Ecotourism Foundation representing Sri Lanka at the Bhutan Conference, made a Presentation on "Ecotourism for Sustainable Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia with special reference to Sri Lanka"

The participants agreed and emphasized that it is crucial to integrate women into the process of sustainable Ecotourism development. The Workshop held in Thimpu, Bhutan in September, 2014, the delegates from all South Asian countries attended agreed and emphasized that it is crucial to integrate women into the process of sustainable Ecotourism development which is one of the noble objectives of SWAN. SWAN's vision is to achieve sustainable development for South Asia through an integrated approach incorporating the centrality of women's agency, voice, participation and leadership in every aspect of sustainable devolvement.

This Workshop deliberated extensively upon the potential of tourism in South Asia. Discussions highlighted the fact that the unique topographies found in the region, its civilization, heritage and geographical and biological diversity, offer enormous scope for the promotion of Ecotourism as a tool for social and economic development.

The eight participating countries have identified sites in their respective countries for development of rural and Ecotourism Projects. They are India, Bangladesh, Afghanistan, Bhutan, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka.

In Sri Lanka, SWAN, Sri Lanka Chapter, initiated an Ecotourism Project and Camp Site at Hikkaduwa in the close proximity to the Hikkaduwa Holiday Resort.

Editor's Note

Ecotourism shines in South Asia

Congratulations to SWAN, for its landmark Ecotourism and Social Enterprise Project for Ecotourism Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia.

The Regional Workshop on "Rural and Ecotourism based Social Enterprise Project for Sustainable Development and Gender Empowerment in South Asia" was hosted by South Asia Women's Network (SWAN) and held at the India Habitat Centre, New Delhi, on the 25th November, 2019, supported by Tata Trusts India and the UN ESCAP, New Delhi. The SWAN Delegates from South Asia gathered at the India Habitat Centre, New Delhi, on the 25th November, 2019, discussed at length how to promote their flagship Ecotourism Projects in South Asia initiated by SWAN in 2014, August/September, Thimpu, Bhutan.

SWAN Project is the first ever Women Centric Ecotourism Project initiated in South Asia. The process in project formulation was completed by 2016, and a proposal has already submitted to the SAARC Development Fund (SDF) for funding. In between, two pilot projects under the SWAN Project have already been started by Himmotthan Society, Dehradun in India and Hikkaduwa in Sri Lanka.

The Workshop followed by two days Field Trip to Uttarakahand, Dehradun and Jardipani in India, deliberated extensively on the enormous power and potential of rural tourism and ecotourism as facilitators for gender empowerment through socio-economic development focused on poverty alleviation, protection of the environment, building of institutional and human resource capacity. Tourism is a natural avenue for revenue generation across South Asia. It is also the most instinctive and successful way to bring the peoples of South Asia closer to each other. Ecotourism is environmentally and socially friendly responsible tourism. It inculcates respect for different cultures and subcultures, and is sesential for sustainable development of the regions and its people in the Asia-Pacific Region.

The Field Trips to Him Vikas Self-Reliant Cooperative at Jadipani, Uttarakhand in northeast India were a wonderful experience to all SWAN delegates to understand and observe first hand on the operational aspects of Home Stay and Community Camping in Jadipani which were administrated by a Federation of Women in the locality. These could be replicated in the other SWAN Ecotourism Projects too. These women stake holders ranging from young to aged (old) members are very efficient and mindful of what they are up to.

The two main important programmes were at the center of discussion during the Workshop were the Certification for SWAN Ecotourism Projects/Home Stay and the Marketing and Promotions. UN-ESCAP South and South West Asia Regional Office (SSWAO) in New Delhi, has offered its generous support to educate and train women stake holders of the SWAN Ecotourism Projects in South Asia on Market Outreach through their proposed E-Portal in collaboration with SWAN. As highlighted at the Workshop, e-portal could be a serious sustained effort which is necessary to attract domestic and international visitors to the ecotourism projects, year round from all over the world. Once the proposed e-portal comes off the ground it will be an impetus to manage ecotourism projects with viably and sustainably.

The other important issue discussed at the Workshop was Certification/Standards for Home Stay and Ecotourism Projects initiated by the SWAN Project Partners. Ms. Seema Bhatt, National NRM and Biodiversity Expert, UN FAO (New Delhi), and Honey Vice President of the Ecotourism Society of India and Palitha Gurusinghe, President, Sri Lanka Ecotourism Foundation enlightened the delegates on the importance of Certification, particularly for Homestay and Ecotourism activities. Marketing and Certification are vital components to bring the quality wise development for any Ecotourism Project

Ms. Seema Bhatt, in her presentation enlightened the participants on Certification for Ecotourism and said "Certification is one of the path-breaking issues. The rapid growth of ecotourism businesses, including rural tourism, has brought with it the practice of 'green washing' where tourism enterprises present 'green', 'ecologically friendly', or themselves as 'responsible', with no benchmark to measure or establish the veracity of these claims. An important way to prevent such unethical practices is to set standards for best practices and then, to develop and implement a certification scheme. Certification for ecotourism can be viewed as a tool that helps promote social equity and a sustainable environment. Certification adds credibility to an enterprise and ensures the professional nature of the initiative. This also provides an opportunity for selfevaluation and subsequent improvement of operating standards

In theory, certification is like an appraisal of management practices. However, in reality, a reliable certification system needs the development of benchmarks that have been agreed upon by a diverse group of stakeholders in a participatory manner. In addition, there is the need for auditors who are independent of the enterprise to endorse the process. Ms Seema Bhatt will discuss all these issues".

The South Asia Women's Network (SWAN) emphasizes the significance of ecotourism for gender empowerment and sustainable development in South Asia. SWAN strongly supports the need for a certification process through a set of standards and guidelines. Through the discussions at the Inception Workshop, and in the follow-up after the Workshop, SWAN will focus on preparing a template of desirable inputs to ensure that the certification process is as comprehensive as possible. The issue of security, especially for women visiting and working at ecotourism facilities, is vital. SWAN will work towards a compilation of certification approaches specifically for the ecotourism sector of various countries (including in South Asia). A comparative study of home-stay guide-lines and ecotourism certification processes as an output of the Inception Workshop can surely be valuable as inputs for practitioners and policy-makers alike.

Palitha Gurusinghe, President, Sri Lanka Ecotourism Foundation also made a combined presentation on Ecotourism Certification, Issues and Challenges of Home Stay Programmes in Asia-Pacific and the Hikkaduwa Woemn Centric Ecotourism Project in Sri Lanka

NATURE & WILDLIFE IN THE ASIA PACIFIC REGION Lost elephant seal pup closely guarded on visit

Ayoung southern elephant seal - the largest of all seals - was spotted by amazed witnesses near Unawatuna this week, the first time an elephant seal has been spotted in the northern Indian Ocean.Southern elephant males can be more than 7m (20 feet) long and weigh almost 4,000kg. These massive creatures take their name from their trunk-like inflatable snouts with which they produceloud roars, especially during the breeding season.Fishermen and other visitors who spotted the young elephant seal on a beach near Unawatuna on November 20 were baffled by the sight, wondering if it was a seal or a sealion but knowing that both those species live in much cooler climates.Video footage was widely shared, and after studying the videos, marine mammal specialist Dr. Asha de Vos recognised the visitor to be a juvenile southern elephant seal (Mirounga leonine). Pups of this species are born with fur and are completely black.Southern elephant seals live in subAntarctic and Antarctic waters that feature extremely cold conditions but are rich in fish, squid, and other marine foods, according to the magazine, National Geographic.Experts said this was the first record of such a seal being seen in the northern Indian Ocean.After being notified by villagers, the Department of Wildlife Conservation's (DWC)'s Hikkaduwa unit rushed to the beach to take care of the creature."We reached the beach around 10am and made sure the animal was safe. The seal was about 6 feet (1.8m) long and its behavior suggested it wanted to come to the beach to rest," Ranger Uthpala Adaranga said.

The navy and police also helped ensure the unusual visitor's safety and it was there on the beach until nightfall, Mr. Adaranga said. "The next day, it was gone, and we hope it will find its path," the ranger added hopefully.A scientist at the National Aquatic Resources Research and Development Agency (NARA), Upul Liyanage, who was present in the scene, said the seal could have been dragged off its course and towards Sri Lankan by an oceanic current linked to the north- east monsoon.Dr. de Vos said vagrant southern elephant seals had been recorded in unusual places. "We do notknow why this happened this time but it is important that the seal be given space to rest if it is found again," she urged.As global warming causes polar ice sheets to shrink, seals that depend on the ice for resting, mating and giving birth are having their mating cycles disrupted, scientists said.The warming is also damaging the food web affecting algae, krill and plankton in polar regions where seals live. As food availability decreases, seals and other creatures might have to move further from their native grounds, which makes them vulnerable to harm.



Sri Lanka Navy releases 32 sea turtles trapped in shrimp farms, North West Sri Lanka



The Navy, during a patrol in the sea area between Thalpadu and Southbar in Mannar, managed torelease 32 sea turtles trapped in shrimp farms on 24th November 2019. The North Central Naval Command while patrolling the sea area between Thalpadu and South bar had spotted several sea turtles trapped in shrimp farms set up by farmers. Responding quicklyto the plight of the animals, the Navy managed to release 32 sea turtles trapped in those farms back into the ocean. There are seven species of sea turtles that are listed as endangered, of which five are found off the coast of Sri Lanka. Meanwhile, to protect these endangered species, naval personnel are constantly working on several sea turtle conservation projects under 'Neela HarithaSangramaya', a visionary concept of Commander of the Navy, Vice Admiral Piyal De Silva.

Story of Ecotourism Sri Lanka



"Story of Ecotourism Sri Lanka" is written basically from the practical point of view, through the experience gained by the author over the years. Palitha thought it is good to record important land marks of Sri Lanka Ecotourism for the benefit of those who are interested, inquisitive and looking forward to widen their horizons in Ecotourism.

In Sri Lanka, many, even some academics, researchers and most of the tourism officials, government, local government, bank officials, and the tourism stakeholders do not clearly understand what Ecotourism is and often mix up the concept with adventure and nature tourism. Therefore, perhaps, to some extent, the information contained in the publication may help decision makers, academics and students who are pursuing their studies and researches in Ecotourism.

"Story of Ecotourism Sri Lanka" is a recollection of important land marks of Ecotourism development in Sri Lanka. For the author himself, it was something like 'Going down the Memory Lane' of his journey through twenty one years, and how he got involved in promoting Ecotourism in Sri Lanka. Therefore, by reading this book, you could get an idea on what Ecotourism is and to what extent the concepts of Ecotourism and activities are integrated and rooted into the tourism fabric in Sri Lanka.

In this book, the author has attempted to provide information on the enormous potential the Island possess to position Sri Lanka as an Ecotourism Destination on the world tourism map and also to identify the major issues and challenges that Ecotourism confronted in Sri Lanka. At the same time, he has clearly highlighted how Ecotourism in Sri Lanka could contribute to alleviating poverty in the tourism generating areas and support environmental and biodiversity conservation in Sri Lanka.



However, the author is of the view that Sri Lanka Ecotourism is still not developed up to the satisfactory standards in comparison to our neighboring countries in South Asia, South East Asia and the Pacific Region. To substantiate his views, he has sighted good examples and case studies from some countries like Sikkim, Tripura (India) and Bhutan etc.
